




# Summer Internship~ Rashidat Soetan

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My name is Rashidat Soetan and I am currently a junior at SUNY New Paltz. I am a psychology major who is looking to go into the field of Physical Therapy. I felt the best way to get a head start on my future career is by getting some volunteer experience within the field. A lot of the Physical Therapy schools require that you have plenty of experience simply to make the transition into PT school a bit easier because you know what to expect.

This past summer my pastor recommended I go to Jamaica Physical Therapy,



an outpatient center. It is located in Jamaica, Queens in New York City. I spent about five weeks there, two days a week because I was also taking summer courses at the time. The head therapist, Dr. Sam Olaogun, was very flexible with my schedule and made my time there run very smoothly. I would usually work on Mondays from 4:30 pm to 8:00 pm and Fridays from 9:00 am to 8:00 pm. The long Fridays were to ensure that I got as many hours as possible, which worked out great because I ended up with about 71.3 hours at the end of the summer. All the long tiring days were worth it.

Volunteering definitely confirmed that Physical Therapy is what I want to choose as a profession. Since I am not licensed as a Physical Therapist yet and had no prior experience in a PT office, I was a bit limited to what I could and could not do. My job was to simply bring materials to the Physical Therapist on duty. Materials such as hot packs and cold packs, electrodes, and supplies needed for the ultrasound and massage. I was given full access to view the electrical stimulation process and understand how it works. I was even able to remove hot and cold packs and electrodes from the patients once the treatment was complete. After patients were finished with their treatment, they were usually given a list of exercises to do. I was able to assist patients with their exercises and show them how to use the machines.

Overall I had a great experience at Jamaica Physical Therapy and learned a great deal of useful information. I met a lot of really nice patients who always had stories or words of advice. The only thing I would say I disliked was the distance of the office from my house and having a long commute. Other than that there is no reason that I wouldn't go back. Definitely a great environment to learn in!

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
#### 2012 SUMMER RESEARCH PROGRAM ~ MARIA ORTIZ
